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A MESSAGE FROM JIM BEEBE

LEARNING HOW TO FORGIVE

As a chaplain for the Victim Assistance Program in Akron, Ohio, I listened to the horror stories of family members who had lost loved ones during violent crimes. Always, at the end, there would be harsh words about how the criminal justice system was not working and that justice demands retribution, restitution and remorse from the criminals. My natural response, of course, was, "Exactly!" But then two thoughts would intercede. First, as normal as these responses were, the victims seemed to be giving away their freedom; that is, they were *allowing* the perpetrators of these violent crimes to have a large measure of psychic control over their lives.

The second thought was actually more of a question: "*How, under these circumstances, can people do what Jesus commanded them to do — to love their enemies, to do good to those who hate them, to bless those who curse them, and to pray for those who abuse them?*" Most people don't know where to start, so listening to C.S. Lewis might help. [[Mere Christianity](#)] Here's his advice:

- (1) You have to practice forgiving your enemies, but don't *start* with those who commit egregious crimes (in his era, that would have been the Gestapo); rather, start with your spouse or partner or parents or children for something they did or said last week.
- (2) Don't think that you have to make your enemy into someone who is not so bad after all (in other words, don't excuse their bad behavior — call it what it is). Only when you 're genuinely hurt do you have the power to forgive.
- (3) Remember that we've been forgiving our own bad behavior our whole lives. And even if you harbor bad feelings about your enemy, pray for his or her healing. In Lewis' words, "*That is what is meant in the Bible by loving him: wishing his good, NOT feeling fond of him nor saying he is nice when he is not.*"

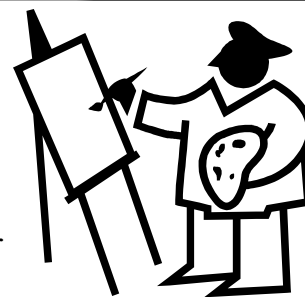
Pray, in other words, "against the grain."

NEWS FROM CAMP GALILEE

For the third year in a row, the Episcopal Church of Nevada will be sponsoring a summer camp for Children of Inmates. This year it is called "Camp Spirit." It will occur from August 12-19, at Camp Galilee, which is on the eastern shores of Lake Tahoe. This is an ecumenical effort, as other churches help us sponsor the children who will attend the camp. Other organizations that engage in prison ministries of any sort may also be able to refer families to us who have a member in prison, whose children are between the ages of 8-12 years old. We are aiming at between 30-40 children between the ages of 8-12. We had wider age ranges before and found it too unwieldy.

The camp experience is free to the families. (Actual costs of the camp per child run about \$450/child, which includes room and board, a lifeguard, nurse, arts & craft materials, water equipment like rafts and paddle boards, afternoon snacks, etc. Registration fees for children at the other summer camps at Camp Galilee are \$300/child). We provide each child with a backpack with a Bible (courtesy of Angel Tree), flashlight, notebook of blank paper, pencil, pen, sun block, bug repellent, etc., and they are provided a snack every afternoon in between lunch and dinner. Staff includes three priests and one deacon; one Hispanic and one African-American person. All the adult staff are volunteers. We will be paying four young people--two young women and two young men in their late teens or early 20's, to be camp counselors to work more directly with the children, sleep in their cabins, etc.

The schedule begins with chapel first thing every morning, followed by breakfast. Then clean-up in cabins, meeting as a group, discussion times, small group time, play time, lunch, beach time, nap, snack time, arts & crafts, dinner. Group time, small group discussions, songs & games, singing and shared prayers at Point Prayer (gather around a rustic wood cross at an overlook of the beach and water), back to cabin and lights out. There will be one hike, a star gazing night, nature walks, and various fun surprises for the children. It is a wonderful, safe, fun time for the children and hopefully will have a positive effect on the rest of their lives.

We would greatly appreciate any help you can give us in fund raising and transportation of children. Below are lists of needs we are still working on. Your referrals would be appreciated. Mike & Donna Margerum are the couple in charge of the camp this year. Mike is the head program person and Donna is the business manager.

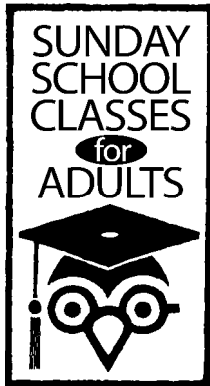

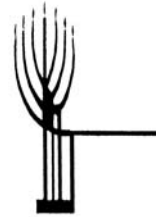

JEWES AND CHRISTIANS: LIVING IN THE COMMON ERA



A joint program of NTHC and St. Patrick's Church

As you've probably heard by now, Rev. Jim Beebe and I will be offering this six-session program every other Saturday beginning June 16th. The goals of the program are:

- a. Attitude: to move from seeing the other as stranger to seeing them as partner or neighbor.
- b. Belief: to achieve a more sophisticated understanding of the others' tradition as well as a deepened appreciation of our own.
- c. Behavior: to act in such a way as not to demean the other through our worship, our theology, or our traditions.

In the words of Jewish scholar Jean Halperin, "*We not only need to understand one another, we need one another to understand ourselves.*" Understanding how the historical relationship with the other has shaped – or misshaped – the historical development of our traditions enables us to guide the development of our traditions in the future with far greater wisdom and insight.

We need a relationship with the other to know more of what it can mean to have a relationship with God. Learning others' traditions and seeing how our own tradition looks in their eyes makes our apparent how much of our expressions are culture-bound. Dialogue helps us to understand the other on their own terms rather than through our own beliefs and convictions. Dialogue also allows us to see ourselves through the eyes of the other. Long-standing prejudices and stereotypes begin to lose their power.

The method for this program will be dialogue; the primary purpose of dialogue is to learn – that is to change and grow in the perception and understanding of reality, and then to act accordingly. The aim is conversing, not convincing.

We will use two books by Thomas Cahill as starting points: *Gifts of the Jews* and *Desire of the Everlasting Hills*, and will read these against the background of the Bible to try to understand the origins of Christianity in Judaism, to look at the world in which Christianity grew from Judaism, and to examine the actual teachings of both Testaments as distinct from the teachings that have grown over the years as a reaction to each side's being threatened by or adversarial toward the other.

We ask that participants make two commitments – to read the books and to attend at least five of the six sessions of the program. There is no cost to participate and sessions will run from 10 am to 1 pm at the Community Room of the Incline Village Library. Please call the NTHC office to register so that we can know how many people to expect. Registrations from St. Patrick's are coming in and I hope that we will have a significant showing from NTHC as well.

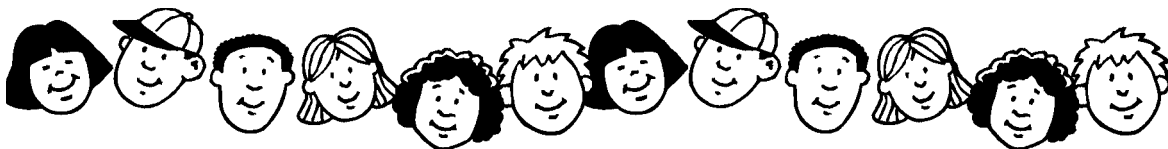
EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EFM) COMPLETES FIRST YEAR

CHILDREN'S EDUCATION DIVERSIFIES

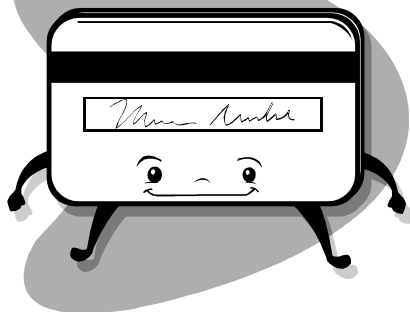

Lazy Fundraising



You shop, right? Groceries. Clothes. Trips. Sundries. Online. Eating out. How would you like to turn that shopping into fund raising at no cost to you other than five minutes of your time? OK, maybe fifteen minutes. That's all it takes to get enrolled in our two scrip programs. And getting enrolled is all that it takes to have contributions sent to St. Patrick's. No more time or effort on your part!

St. Patrick's is enrolled in two different scrip programs:

- eScrip Register your credit cards one time. That's all you need to do. Then each time you use one of these cards at a participating merchant, St. Patrick's gets bucks. How cool is that? Totally safe and secure, and you don't even have to remember which merchants participate or use a special card. You can even register your Safeway card and give St. Patrick's a boost while you're saving money. For all of 2006, fourteen of us raised \$218.22. Think how this would swell if everyone helped out. Some groups are getting thousands of dollars thru this program.

The Raley's Quality of Life cards. Get a Raley's card and hand it to the clerk each time you buy your groceries there. Doesn't cost you a dime, but St. Patrick's gets dollars. We did better with this program in 2006 with \$610.41 coming to St. Patrick's. If you don't have a card yet, get one; if you do, be sure to use it.

Raley's Stop at the church office and pick up a card. It has to be registered for us to get the benefit, but Jessica will be glad to do that for you. Or see me on Sunday after the 10:00a.m. service.

Current card users: Please verify that your card is still active and associated with St. Patrick's. 1) Go to our Web site, <http://www.tahoeepiscopal.com/> 2) Click **Our Scrip Programs** in the left pane and scroll to the bottom. 3) Click **More information and activation**. 4) Click **Click here to edit your account**. 5) Type your card number and password, and click **Enter**.
