Yes we did – we raised \$400,000 and paid off St. Patrick's mortgage on March 26th. It was a big challenge, but you made it happen. The campaign to pay off the mortgage began in January 2007 when the balance was \$397,000.

Under the leadership of Chuck Meyer, our treasurer, the campaign team received training from fund-raising experts from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley and St. Francis Catholic Church here in Incline.

Then seven social events were held at various parishioners' homes where Chuck and his team briefed the guests on the "Banks or Babies" campaign. The campaign name was derived from our goal of using the interest we were paying to the "bank" to fund outreach programs that would help "babies" and others in need.

After the socials the campaign teams visited our parishioners, and 76 families generously responded. Many thanks go to each of those families and to the team members who made the visits (Jim Beebe, Dave Mussatti, Jim Kelly, Chuck & Laurean Meyer, Nancy Joslin, Emy Gurowitz, Eric Strotz and Caroline Cutler). Thanks also go to our graphic designer Marsha Tejeda and those who hosted the socials (Cherry & Steve Barney, Peggy & Tom Harrison, Sharon & John Kirby, Connie & Bob Skidmore, Marilyn & Jim Johnston, Judy & Don Morrison, Ginny Hestmark, and Clare Novak).

RAIN Asks Nevada Legislature To Preserve the State's Social Safety Net By Larry Struve, RAIN Advocate

On Feb. 2, 2009, just prior to the start of the 2009 Nevada Legislative Session, more than 130 committed Christians from all over the State of Nevada met at the First United Methodist Church in Carson City to participate in a RAIN Legislative Forum. Many Bishops and church leaders were in attendance. These same leaders participated in the opening ceremony in the Nevada Assembly, in order to emphasize to legislators that people of faith expect their government to consider the common good when legislating, which requires careful consideration of the impact of budget cuts on the most vulnerable people in the population.

During the program itself, powerful presentations were made, featuring some key issues facing the people of Nevada--the impact of the economic downturn on children and families (including the increase in homelessness and loss of homes due to foreclosure), the deterioration of the State's health care safety net (especially for the uninsured and unemployed), the imprudent and wasteful use of money in our criminal justice system that does nothing to reduce recidivism or help victims of crime, and the inability of State government to set realistic budget priorities and raise the needed revenue to fund basic services.

Nevada Chief Justice James Hardesty summarized some of the recommendations the Advisory Commission on the Administration of Justice will make to the 2009 Legislature. They included authorization of a first step in establishing a reentry program for persons released from prison (using fees assessed on defendants, grant funds, and donations as start up monies), development of alternatives to long prison sentences for non-violent offenders, and fuller use of funds designated to help victims of crime. The suggestions were innovative, thought-provoking, and challenging.

Assembly Speaker Barbara Buckley invited the people in attendance to follow the budget hearings carefully in the 2009 session. She promised that every item in the budget will be scrutinized, intimating that some programs will either be reduced, consolidated, or eliminated. Once this budget review is completed, the Legislature will turn its attention to raising the revenue to fund basic services in the budget, as determined by the money committees. It was apparent to the group that the current fiscal problems of the State cannot be solved solely by making draconian cuts in the budget nor by raising taxes substantially. Either approach will not work. A compromise will be needed, and it will require legislators to be patient and understanding of each others' points of view.

Most of those in the audience were active members of Christian churches throughout Nevada, who are deeply engaged in works of social justice, charity, and advocacy for the least among us. It was a very moving, powerful experience. Many who attended spoke of how much they were touched by this event. It had the flavor of a church service, and those who attended were sent out committed to spread the word to Nevada Legislators that people of faith are in no mood for platitudes, empty slogans, and meaningless rhetoric. They want action to preserve programs that serve the least among us, and they will judge legislators both by their words and deeds as they negotiate and struggle to find the right combination of budget cuts and taxes in order to preserve the State's social safety net while serving the common good.

Audit – Gary, Emy, Joe, Bob (should be done in a week or two)

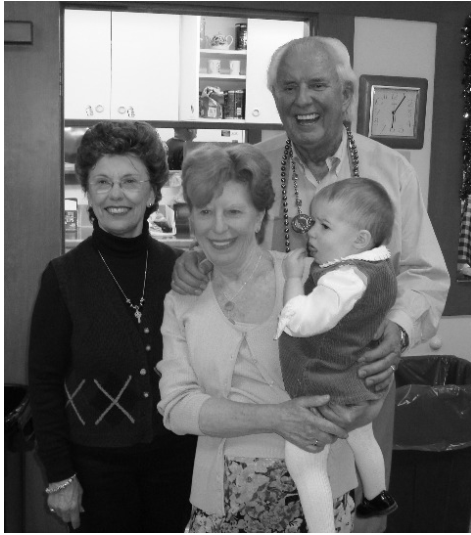
Nominating – Bob (goes to work next November)

Through the year, donations were made to various organizations, including the Kings Beach Family Resource Center, Tahoe Forest Hospital, Incline Elementary School and the American Cancer Society. December saw the following additional groups receiving items: the Holiday Giving Program, right here in Incline Village, sent representatives to the December 3rd meeting; they selected over 100 lovely things to give the families being aided through this effort sponsored by the Parasol Community Collaboration.

Also, one of the guild's members is involved in the Interact Club of North Tahoe Rotary and the Sierra Senior Center in Truckee. She selected some blankets, hats, scarves and shawls to be given out at those groups' Christmas parties. She reported that these gifts were much appreciated by the recipients. The guild is very grateful to have St. Patrick's make the library available for its weekly meetings. As a small thank-you to the church, the women gave a donation to Jim Beebe and Dave Mussatti at its final 2008 meeting. The guild does not collect dues from its members, nor does it conduct fundraisers. "Where then", you might ask, "did the donation funds come from?"

Occasionally, people have given money to the guild for chemo caps they've selected for friends or relatives undergoing chemotherapy. Also, some special requests have been filled and some completed projects purchased. More often than not, members of St. Patrick's have been the ones to make these purchases from the guild. In effect, the giving has gone full-circle: parishioners have given to the guild and the guild has given back to the church! In addition, for the last 2 years, the Parasol Community Collaboration has donated money to the guild to purchase supplies for the gifts members will make to be given through the Holiday Giving Program. I like to think these are examples of people helping people.

2009 is off to a great start! The guild meetings are lively and well-attended; members are bringing in new completed items each week. The Knitting Club at Incline Elementary School is in full swing and the 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students are eager to learn new skills. It is a joy to work with these budding, enthusiastic knitters!

Sierra Nevada College Concert Choir to Perform Mendelssohn's ELIJAH

In celebration of Felix Mendelssohn's 200th birthday, the Sierra Nevada College Concert Choir will be performing his most famous oratorio, Elijah. Concert dates are Thursday and Friday, March 27 and 28 at 7:30 p.m. at St. Patrick's Episcopal Church in Incline Village, with a special April 5th Palm Sunday performance at 3:30 p.m. at the Squaw Valley Chapel.

Elijah is one of Mendelssohn's masterpieces. The story is based on the life of the prophet Elijah. What is remarkable here is that Mendelssohn paints such vivid pictures of the events of Elijah's life. His palette is music. The pieces alternate between exquisite beauty when he is describing angels or that "still small voice"; and the drama and excitement of fiery chariots, fiery horses, whirlwinds, rushing floods, billowing storms, draughts, battles, and Kings.

Stuart Duke will be singing the role of the awe-inspiring hero, Elijah. Other soloists include Incline's own famous photographer, Joy Strotz performing the role of the widow whose child is brought back to life by Elijah's prayers; lovely alto Sara Kuttel as the angel; Trent Lingruen as the youth; Eric Gault (music director of the Lake Tahoe Shakespeare Festival) singing the tenor part of Obadiah; and other solos by beautiful baritones David Pierce and Tim Callicrate, scintillating sopranos Anna Helwing and (local artist) Karen Colbert, and other members of the SNC Concert Choir.

Fortunately, Mendelssohn wrote this oratorio in English so the story-line will be easy to follow.

The SNC concert choir is directed by Donna Axton and is made up students, faculty and staff of SNC, and community members from Incline, Truckee, and points between. The choir has been performing wonderful music for a quarter of a century and is a gem in the crown of the college. This performance will be accompanied by piano and a small orchestra including Liz Glattly on violin and Jay Grauer, who is celebrating his 60th (yes, 60th) year as a professional bassist.

You can purchase tickets ahead of time at **The Potlatch** in Incline, **Squaw Valley Chapel** in Squaw Valley, **Pablo's Gallery** in Tahoe City, the **SNC Bookstore** or from choir members. Advance purchase is \$12; \$15 at the door and \$10 for seniors and students.

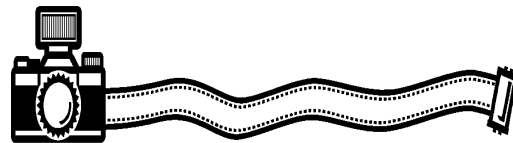
